## From the Editor:

In the far off times, when there were a decent number of members who liked to race, we had an annual Mid Winter Speed Day at Ruapuna, usually with twenty to thirty entries of all sorts, that were organised into fields according to speed. Lots of fun ,no one took it too seriously, and a great place to learn about racecraft. I had my first competitive outing in my Citroen Big 15 at one of these. I was put at the back of the grid, with a suitable warning sign on the bumper to let everyone else know that this was my first race. After a lap or so I'd manage to pass someone, the car hadn't exploded, and I had another car in my sights as I approached the hairpin, feeling that this racing business was all a bit of a doddle, and that I was a naturally talented driver. There was sudden roar and a screech of tortured rubber as George Calder, in his wonderful Riley Special, hurtled up the inside, outbraked me, slid round the hairpin and vanished into the distance. I'm still recovering.

There were handicap races, Le Mans starts, which favoured the more athletic drivers, and one year, it was decided to have a bike race. Entrants were asked to bring the oldest pushbike they could find, and we lined up for a race of one lap. There were three Penny Farthings, a number of early racing bikes, and I was on my father's 1950 Humber Sports model with the Sturmey Archer three speed hub. Entrants included Gavin Bain, Peter Croft, George Calder, Tim and James Palmer. It's long way round Ruapuna on a bike, even the short circuit, and after a few hundred desperate metres, most of us were completely buggered. But that finely honed and toned athlete Gavin Bain, on his Penny Farthing (ordinary) surprised everyone by winning, as the photo shows. Wisely, Gavin refused all

offers of sponsorship and retired from competitive cycle racing while still at the top, but sent these photos to prove his moment of glory.





In case some of you cynics think that the late great Laurence Pomeroy was simply a mythical figure, the photo provided by Gavin Bain below proves otherwise.




